Letters to Blue Notes

Dear Blue Notes Readers:

The following script reveals a cute little bug in IBM DOS 3.30:

I have two standard diskette drives A: and B:. My fixed disk, C: is labeled FIXED DISK.

Boot the DOS 3.30 Startup diskette in A:. Place the DOS 3.30 Operating diskette in B:.

Change the current drive to B:.

Execute command VOL A:, getting the response, "Volume in drive A has no label." Execute commands APPEND /X & APPEND C:\. Execute command VOL A:, getting the response, "Volume in drive B is FIXED DISK."

When it finds no label on the specified drive, VOL reports the default drive letter instead of the specified one, and reports a label found on the append path. The symptom disappears if you skip the first append command, so apparently APPEND /X and VOL are incompatible. Since the DIR routine calls the VOL routine, the symptom appears in directory listings. That's where I discovered it. I have found no cure.

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Dear Blue Notes Readers:

I just received a copy of Volume 266 (PC Magazine's benchmark tests). About the only test that runs on my machine is the processor speed test but not the printer or display tests. Either a call for BRUN20.LIB appears or the computer hangs up. I have a PC clone (Sanyo 885) with 640 KB, running at 8 MHz under DOS 2.11. Any ideas or have you heard of similar problems?

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
